CPSHE this November.....

Herman Dange - Drug and Gang Crime

Year 9 and Year 10 students had a talk from Hermen Dange. Hermen was previously in prison for his involvement with drugs and gang crime. He turned his life around whilst in prison and now dedicates his time to many other projects and talks to inspire young people to want to make the right choices. Hermen discussed how making the right choices and being around the right people can keep you safe and keep you from trouble which could be harmful to you or others. Hermen went into detail putting forward practical ways to turn time spent on social media from negative time to positive. He talked about the way prison life can be portrayed on social media being far from the truth and what the reality is like. Students learnt ways they can say no to friends when it involves doing things that are not in their best interests. The feedback from the students has been really positive and they said it had made them think about how they spend their time outdoors or online. Students also feedback that they did not realise how bad prison actually was. As always, we will follow up from this talk in our future CPSHE lessons and build on this experience.



Hope Hack: Youth Engagement - Humberside Violence Prevention Partnership

Some of our Year 11, 12 and 13 students visited GIFHE for a Youth Engagement Opportunity with the Police. Students had the opportunity to listen to a short talk from Jonathon Evison, Humberside Police and Crime Commissioner, who talked about the importance of young people not being stereotyped for always engaging in antisocial behaviour when in reality it is only a small few. He stressed how important it is that our young people have a say in how we can ensure, that we all feel safer and fairer within our communities. He asked them to come up solutions for this and their voices would be heard. Students attended workshops throughout the day and then presented their findings to the whole of the event attendees including the police who have taken away all their ideas and solutions. The police praised our students for their hard work, ideas and fantastic presentations that day. They were all nervous yet all spoke with passion and confidence. Humberside police are now starting a new group following on from this event in which our students will attend on a weekly basis in their own time to grow in their opportunity of having a voice and making a difference within communities. We are very excited about this and we will keep you notified.



The overall theme of this event was hope, and there was lots of discussion about what our students hopes are for their futures, and how this can be achieved. Andrew Smith, Manager of the ACTion to combat modern slavery, gave his own story of hope and shared his own personal experiences to which our students said they felt inspired. They were able to

chat to him at the end of the event. Andrew has told the Academy that the students he met were also inspirational young people and was extremely pleased to have spoken with them. Again, this is something we will continue to discuss and work on within future CPSHE lessons, across all Year groups.



DFDS Fish in School Hero

Fish in School Hero is delivered through a partnership between the Food Teachers' Centre and the Fishmongers' Company's Fisheries Charitable Trust.

It was part of the programme's 'Mighty Mussels' initiative, after family-run business Offshore Shellfish donated 2,000kg of rope-grown mussels, which were cleaned and packed by River Teign Shellfish before being delivered by DFDS to 250 schools across the country.

Simon Gray, of the Fish in Schools Hero programme, said: "The goal of our programme is simple yet impactful, we aim to ensure that every child gets a chance to prepare, cook and eat fish before they leave school.

Ivan Weatherhogg, Commercial Director, UK Coldchain at DFDS, was at the academy to greet the delivery.

He said: "DFDS is proud to be able to assist the Fishmongers Association and the Food Teachers Centre to deliver mussels to 250 schools nationwide under the Fish in School Hero scheme.

We fully support the aim to teach children how to cook with seafood, and to reinstate the importance of the UK seafood industry to the next generation, hoping they develop a taste for cooking and preparing different species.

"This will enable the seafood industry to keep growing and, along with partners such as us, to sustain its current footprint. We look forward to continuing our support for such initiatives to further improve the sector's popularity."

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Teacher Bernadette Morgan, Assistant Curriculum Leader said "We had Years 8 and 9 choosing from three different recipes given by Fish Heroes: French Marinière, Thai green curry or Italian tomato and garlic.

"All the dishes created by the students were delicious and I'm sure these recipes inspired their taste buds."

Principal Nigel Whittle also thanked the companies and organisations that had made the opportunity possible.

"It was a brilliant link up between the academy and industry, giving our students a different kind of cooking experience," he said. "It is important to encourage our students to eat healthily and fresh fish, sourced in the UK, is highly nutritious and an important part of a balanced diet, which will help their learning."







Shoebox Appeal 2023

Generous students and staff at Waltham Toll Bar Academy and Toll Bar Sixth Form have filled a bumper number of shoeboxes to help bring Christmas cheer to vulnerable children abroad.



Principal Nigel Whittle said some students had brought in enough donations to fill multiple 13 boxes on their own. Year 10 student Isabella Owen managed to fill 13 boxes this year.

together to make a fantastic contribution to the Shoebox Appeal," he said.



"There has been a real sense of charitable giving around the Academy for both appeals. Times are tough for many families, making this year's generosity even more telling.

Assistant Principal Ollie Fothergill also praised everyone who had contributed.

"It has been wonderful to see so many of our young people come together," he said.

"We teach them about the importance of the world community and helping each other, and it has been fantastic to see our young people truly living out the values of the Academy during a time of international hardship."

Karen Lepley from Grimsby Shoeboxes said: "I can't believe there are 160 boxes! That is the largest amount we have ever collected from any school. This is fantastic. We've had to use multiple vehicles for the collection."
